IACP Announces Grant Recipients

Alexandria, VA – The International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) is pleased to announce that it will be working with three agencies for the *Service, Support & Justice: A Strategy to Enhance Law Enforcement Response to Victims Initiative*, a multi-year demonstration project funded by the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC), U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ). The City of Chattanooga Police Department (TN), Saginaw Police Department (MI), and Casper Police Department (WY) were selected following a rigorous peer review process and further vetting by OVC, the National Institute of Justice (NIJ), and IACP.

In 2009, the IACP released a national strategy and resource toolkit to enhance law enforcement's response to victims. Under the Enhancing Law Enforcement Response to Victims (ELERV) initiative, funded by OVC, the national Strategy and accompanying resources were developed, pilot-tested, and validated over the course of several years. While the ELERV initiative provided a strong direction to law enforcement agencies, the Strategy was never formally evaluated.

In this next phase of the project, the overarching goal is to evaluate the ELERV Strategy and to determine whether it is evidence-based. The selected sites will implement the ELERV Strategy with training and technical assistance from the IACP. At the same time, the implementation of the ELERV Strategy will be evaluated to determine its effectiveness in creating a cultural transformation within the selected law enforcement communities in their response to victims of crime.

Demonstration sites will be reimbursed by OVC for up to \$100,000 each year for the next three years to support their agency's participation in the initiative.
